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Auction house unveils Graham's banknote treasures

Treaty No. 3 medal has noted pedigree

rare 1892 Canadian Bank of ACommerce \$5 note with a Yukon overprint, one of the most storied pieces of Canadian chartered banknote history, will headline the debut of the Robert (Bob) Graham Collection at Geoffrey Bell Auctions' fall sale on Friday, Oct. 3, during the Toronto Coin Expo.

About 150 chartered banknotes from Graham's collection will be offered in this first session, with additional instalments to follow in 2026.

Auctioneer Brian Bell called the Graham dispersal a landmark moment for collectors.

"There was a lot of his heart in that collection," he said, noting Graham's particular passion for the Bank of Commerce and its amalgamated banks after forging a personal connection with the grandson of Edmund Walker, a former president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Featured on the cover of the 64page catalogue is Lot 582: the Canadian Bank of Commerce \$5 Yukon overprint. Bell described it as "one of Canada's most famous and storied rarities," tied to the Klondike Gold Rush when the sudden influx of prospectors created a shortage of circulating currency in the Yukon Territory. "The condition is as good as it gets," he said, pointing to population reports that show as few as five

to eight examples known. Catalogued by Charlton as CH 75-14-04c, this example is graded by Legacy as VF-35, carries the "Yukon" overprint twice in blue ink and is estimated at \$27,000 to \$30,000.

Another star of the Graham collection is Lot 571: a Canadian Bank of Commerce \$2 note dated 1867 with a Hamilton overprint. Bell called it "a particularly personal

From gold standard to central bank: Canada's path

This is the second story in a three-part series exploring money's history. This instalment highlights the free market, the gold standard, and the evolution of reserve and central banking systems.

The eventual abandonment of gold as money's anchor spurred a financial revolution, fundamentally transforming how nations managed their economies — with Canada at the forefront of these seismic changes.

By the late 19th century, as global trade expanded and industrialization accelerated, the world's major econo-

mies converged around gold as their monetary foundation. From 1854 until the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, Canada operated continuously under the gold standard, with the Canadian dollar fixed in terms of gold and valued at par with the U.S. dollar. Under this system, monetary policy ran largely "on automatic pilot," according to the 2010 Bank of Canada book A History of the Canadian Dollar, with paper money freely convertible into gold without restriction. There were no controls on gold imports or exports.

"When a man deposits goods at a warehouse, he is given a receipt and pays the owner of the warehouse a certain sum for the service of storage," U.S. economist Murray Rothbard

wrote in his 1962 book, Man, Economy & State. "He still retains ownership of the property; the owner of the warehouse is simply guarding it for him. When the

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
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

Odjig's art enters circulation on \$2 coin

aphne Odjig, the groundbreaking Anishinaabe artist whose bold vision reshaped the place of Indigenous art in Canada and abroad, is now being honoured on a new \$2 circulation coin issued by the Royal Canadian Mint.

Born in 1919 in Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory on Manitoulin Island, Odjig overcame the cultural suppression of her youth to become one of Canada's most celebrated artists. Her work, characterized by sweeping lines, vivid colours, and layered storytelling, drew from her Odawa and Potawatomi heritage and became a vital force in the recognition of Indigenous art in galleries across Canada and beyond.

The Mint has produced a total of three million coins for circulation, with two million colourized and one million in the traditional uncoloured finish. Canadians will begin finding them in their change as banks and businesses replenish their inventories of \$2

The reverse of the coin adapts Odjig's 1977 painting The Folk Singer. At its centre, the design shows a female figure holding a drum, cropped to highlight her flowing lines and stylized form. Surrounding the inner core is a rim that features Odjig's stylized drawing of a fisher, taken from her monumental 1978 masterpiece The Indian in Transition. The fisher was more than a visual motif — it was a signature emblem Odjig often included with her name, a nod to the English translation of "Odjig."

The colourized version places vivid red, yellow, and blue accents on the figure, while the uncoloured coin relies on the engraving alone to capture Odjig's distinctive style. The obverse features the effigy of King Charles III, designed by Canadian artist Steven Rosati.

"Daphne Odjig was a gifted storyteller, a bold path breaker, and a born teacher," said Anishinaabe artist and educator Bonnie Devine. "For more than fifty years she enriched our lives with her drawings and paintings. She would have been tickled to know that her life's work was being honoured on a Canadian toonie."

Odjig's artistic journey began in Toronto in the 1940s, where she studied galleries and libraries for inspiration while raising her family. She later lived in British Columbia and Manitoba, developing her art and reconnecting with her cultural roots at the 1964 Wiikwemkoong Pow Wow. Her career spanned both minimalist sketches and large-scale, richly coloured canvases, many of which expressed the history and resilience of First Nations communities.

The reverse of the \$2 commemorative circulation coin features Daphne Odiig's 1977 painting "The Folk Singer," with a female figure holding a drum, surrounded by her stylized drawing of a fisher from the 1978 masterpiece "The Indian in Transition."

In 1973, Odjig co-founded the Professional Native Indian Artists Inc., often called the "Indian Group of Seven," alongside Alex Janvier, Norval Morrisseau, Jackson Beardy, Carl Ray, Eddy Cobiness, and Joseph Sanchez. Together, they not only created powerful works of art but also campaigned for recognition, fair

Did You KNOW ???

The first modern bimetallic coin was the 500 Lire, released for circulation in Italy in 1982. The coin featured a silver-coloured ring, with a gold-coloured centre (similar to our Toonie), and was in use until the introduction of the Euro on 1 January 2002. The 500 Lire was also the first coin to include the denomination in Braille. Similar coins were issued for San Marino and Vatican City, but did not include Braille.

PARCEL TRAFFIC TO U.S. PLUNGES

Many Canadian businesses have temporarily "paused" orders to the United States after the Trump administration eliminated the long-standing de minimis exemption for low-value parcels. The Universal Postal Union (UPU) reports that overall postal traffic into the U.S. has dropped by more than 80 per cent since the new rules came into effect Aug. 29.

Canadian businesses are seeking clarity and say they are waiting on Canada Post and carriers to implement proper systems to determine whether duties and other fees apply. In the meantime, Canada Post and some carriers are also requiring that any applicable tariffs and fees be paid in advance, placing an additional burden on Canadian businesses and online sellers such as eBay.

Previously, imported goods valued at \$800 or less were exempt from customs duties, but now all shipments must be vetted and assessed according to their origin country's tariff rate, which can range from 10 to 50 per cent. U.S. residents, however, remain exempt from duties on gifts up to \$100 and personal souvenirs up to \$200.

The UPU said 88 postal operators have suspended some or all parcel services to the U.S., citing "major operational disruptions." Airlines and carriers indicated they were unwilling or unable to handle customs duty collection, while foreign postal services lacked systems linked to U.S. Customs and Border Protection. Australia Post has announced it will soon resume parcel deliveries to the United States after finding a way to comply with new U.S. tariff requirements. Executive general manager Gary Starr said the temporary suspension is expected to end by Sept. 25, but added the service could restart sooner if systems are ready ahead of schedule.

The end of the exemption comes amid a massive increase in low-value imports, which rose from 134 million parcels annually in 2015 to 1.4 billion in 2025. Before the change, the UPU warned U.S. officials the sudden policy shift could cripple international mail flows, a prediction now borne out by the near-halt in traffic.

BYTOWN BICENTENNIAL THEME FOR ONA MEDAL

The Ontario Numismatic Association (ONA) is now accepting design proposals for the medal marking its 64th annual convention, set for next spring in Ottawa.



This year's medal design competition will highlight the 200th anniversary of Bytown, the settlement founded in 1826 by Lt.-Col. John By of the Royal Engineers during construction of the Rideau Canal. Originally established as a rough-andready lumber town at the canal's base, Bytown grew rapidly before being renamed Ottawa in 1855. Just two years later, on Dec. 31, 1857, Queen Victoria selected Ottawa as the permanent capital of the United Province of Canada, recognizing both its strategic location and symbolic neutrality.

The ONA is encouraging entrants to explore themes beyond the well-worn images of Parliament's Centre Block and the Ottawa Locks.

"Find something other than the Centre Block of Parliament and the Ottawa Locks to mark such a monumental anniversary," reads a notice in the September-October issue of the *Ontario Numismatist*, the ONA's newsletter. At the same time, the association emphasizes that all submissions will be given equal consideration.

Designs must be submitted by Sept. 30 to treasurer@the-ona.ca. Further details are available on the association's website at the-ona.ca. The dates for the 2026 ONA convention had not been finalized as of press time.

The ONA will partner with the Niagara Falls Regional Coin Club to present the Niagara Falls Coin Show on Saturday, Oct. 18. The one-day event takes place at the Columbus Club of Niagara Falls, 6990 Stanley Ave., from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Collectors can browse a wide range of material, with dealers offering Canadian and world coins, paper money, tokens, medals, gold, silver, jewellery and hobby supplies. A Youth Booth will be set up to encourage and engage young collectors

General admission is \$5 and includes parking, while youth under 16 are admitted free.

The Niagara Falls Regional Coin Club meets on the third Wednesday of each month (except July, August and December) at 6:30 p.m. at the Lady Scapular Church Hall, 6557 Thorold Stone Rd. For more details, contact the club at niagaracoinclub@outlook.com.

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Special programs, auctions enhance fall Coin Expo

Canada's premier coin and banknote show returns Oct. 3-4, 2025, when the Toronto Coin Expo opens its doors at the Toronto Reference Library for two days of buying, selling and collecting.

More than 55 dealer tables will fill the downtown venue, offering Canadian, U.S. and world coins, banknotes, tokens, medals, militaria, gold, silver and jewelry. Collectors can buy, sell, trade and have items appraised.

The show runs Friday from 10 a.m.–5 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m.–4 p.m. Admission is \$6, while youth under 16 are admitted free.

Show owner Jared Stapleton says the fall expo continues to attract strong support from both dealers and collectors. "We have lots of dealers coming in from all over Canada," he noted.

Live auctions will again be conducted during the evenings, with Alliance Coin & Banknote taking the podium Thursday and Geoffrey Bell Auctions hosting Friday's sale. Highlights include material from the Robert Graham Collection Collection of Cartered Banknotes, a historic treaty medal and much more. piece" because it bears the manuscript signature of B.E. Walker, then a junior at the Hamilton branch who later rose to become general manager and eventually president of the bank. Graham acquired the note directly from Walker's grandson, E.R. Hunter, making it the only known example available to the public. "It has that extra provenance, which makes it truly unique," Bell said. Catalogued as CH 75-10-04a and graded Fine 15PPQ by Legacy, with serial number 135410/B, it carries an estimate of \$12,000-\$15,000.

chants Bank of Prince Edward Island \$1 note dated 1889. Bell pointed to its scarcity: "Only five are known to collectors, so it's a true Maritime rarity." Catalogued as CH 470-10-04-04 and graded F-12 by Legacy, with serial number 50110/B, this note is estimated at \$9,000-\$11,000.

and veiled, while the reverse shows a commissioner shaking hands with an Indigenous leader against a background of teepees and a rising sun. This piece carries an illustrious pedigree, having passed through the collections of J.D. Ferguson, Michael Kolman (1955) and John J. Ford Jr. (2007). A similar example without this provenance realized \$95,600 at auction.

"The state of preservation is beautiful, and the provenance really elevates it," Bell said.

The auction also boasts one of the most extensive offerings of communion tokens in recent memory. Beginning with Scottish examples, the section expands to Canadian material, with more than 2,000 pieces carefully catalogued with the assistance of researcher Lorne Barnes. "It was a challenge to present in print, but it's all online with photos for bidders," Bell explained.

The sale also includes select consignments from the well-regarded Botany Collection.

Bell noted that the sale also includes a healthy offering of decimal coinage and error pieces. "Because we've done so well with errors in the past, people are consigning more of them to us," he said, adding that the section features a "nice little collection" that will appeal to advanced error special-

As with every Geoffrey Bell Auctions event, the October sale includes an array of material beyond the headline consignments. Collectors will find Canadian decimals, tokens, medals and errors, along with a selection of world issues.

"That's the kind of note you simply don't see," Bell said. "To have it in the Graham collection, with its pedigree, is really something special." Catalogued as CH 375-10-22, this piece is graded Fine with an ink stain on the back and crayon marks on the front. With the signature of Eng. Howland and serial number 83194/B, and pedigrees to both Bill MacDonald and Graham, it carries an estimate of \$10,000-\$11,000.

Rounding out the top-tier rarities is Lot 665: a Mer-

The back cover of the October catalogue is devoted to Lot 300, a rare Indian Treaty No. 3 silver medal from 1873. Weighing 205 grams and measuring 76 millimetres, the medal was struck by Joseph Shepherd Wyon and Albert Benjamin Wyon and presented on behalf of Queen Victoria to Indigenous leaders who signed the Northwest Angle Treaty on Oct. 3, 1873. Bell said interest in these medals has surged in recent years: "They've really gained popularity. We expect this one to break a record, honestly, and hit six figures."

Bell said, echoing a philosophy instilled by his late father, Geoffrey Bell, who passed away in 2024, and Charlton publisher Bill Cross, who died in February. "That's the key."

Proof silver medal 205.0g (76mm) by J.S & A.B Wyon (Jamieson 38). The Northwest Angle Treaty was imposed 3 October 1873 on Ojibway First Peoples to obtain 55,000 square miles from Lake Superior to Hudson's Bay close to the US border. The medal was offered on behalf of Queen Victoria to Nation Leaders who signed the Treaty. These historically important medals were gifts presented to Chiefs who entered into these Treaties in exchange for various goods and Indigenous rights to hunting, fishing and natural resources on reserve lands and offered a lasting visual reminder to all the participants of their treaty commitments. 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Queen Mary \$5 and Victorian brockage star at auction

Note, coin had been stashed away in private collections for generations

newly discovered 1924 A\$5 Queen Mary note with serial number A000002 and an extremely rare Victorian 50-cent brockage headline Alliance Coin and Banknote's 501-lot sale on Thursday, Oct. 2 at the Toronto Coin Expo.

Auctioneer Sean Isaacs describes both items as "astounding" - a word he says he rarely uses - and expects them to generate major excitement among collectors.

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since it was printed more than a century ago, remaining hidden in a private collection for roughly 100 years. Isaacs called it both visually striking and historically important, with its exceptionally low serial number making it unprecedented in Canadian paper money collecting.

"Not only is it a gorgeous note, but the serial number makes it unprecedented," he said. "It hasn't seen the light of day since Dominion times."

The Victorian 50-cent brockage, last sold by longtime dealer Doug Robins in the 1970s, is also being offered publicly for the first time in 50 years. Robins, who died in 2021, was a well-known figure in Canadian numismatics. A brockage occurs when a freshly struck coin sticks to a die and impresses its incuse, mirror-image design onto the next blank planchet. As a result, one side of the coin shows the correct design while the other bears a reversed, indented impression of the opposite side.

While brockage errors are scarce for any Canadian issue, they are extremely rare on Victorian-era silver 50-cent pieces, making this PCGS-certified error a trophy item for advanced collectors.

The auction also features a Hudson's Bay Company

gold service medal from 1920, struck in 15-karat gold and awarded to a staff member of the historic firm. Isaacs called it a "great piece of Hudson's Bay memorabilia," highly unusual and seldom encountered. Hudson's Bay-related material has always been well sought after by collectors, and with the company's demise this year, the medal is expected to generate significant inter-

Additional sections include a strong run of Canadian tokens and medals, among them early coronation medals and a rare Prince of Wales school

medal presented to Canadian students for academic achievement.

Rounding out the sale is what Isaacs describes as the finest U.S. selection Alliance has ever offered. It includes a virtually complete set of commemorative 50-cent pieces highlighted by the coveted Hawaiian issue, a famous 1937-D three-legged buffalo nickel, and several other key U.S. varieties across denominations.

"We always try to have at least one piece in our auction that has either never been offered or hasn't been seen in a generation," Isaacs said. "In this sale, we have more than

Paper money sports ancient links

In this column I would like to reflect upon some of the debt that Canadian banknote designs owe to the ancient past.

To begin with, the three Dominion government issues of 25-cent notes - also referred to as fractional currency because the face value of any one is only a fraction of a dollar - colloquially known as "shinplasters," dated 1870, 1900 and 1923 all feature a different representation of Britannia as part of their face designs. She is also depicted on notes of many chartered banks. Although Britannia, as the representation of Britain – and later the United Kingdom - has been familiar on British coins since the reign of King Charles II, she first appeared on coins of the Roman Empire. We can see her depicted as a minor goddess representing the province with which she shares her name. On the reverse of a brass sestertius of the emperor Hadrian (AD 117-138) she is depicted seated facing right with her right foot on a pile of rocks, her head propped on her right hand, holding a spear in her left, and with a large shield at her side. The legend reads BRITANNIA and the letters SC appear, to show senatorial approval. Britannia also appears on sestertii of Hadrian's successor Antoninus Pius (AD 138-161).

Another ancient deity shown on Canadian bills is the god Mercury, who appears in a vignette along with ships, trains and airplanes to represent transportation on the backs of the 1935 \$2 and 1937 \$10 notes. In Roman mythology Mercury was a son of Jupiter and Maia (daughter of one of the Titans). He was associated with his even older Greek counterpart Hermes.

Among the Romans, Mercury was one of their 12 major gods. As a Roman deity he oversaw commerce, merchants, boundaries, communication, orators, travellers, artists and thieves. It was Mercury who guided the souls of the departed to the underworld after death. But he is primarily remembered today as the messenger of the gods.

The allegory of agriculture that graces the backs of the 1935 and 1937 \$1 bills may owe inspiration to Ceres, the Roman goddess of agriculture, and/or her Greek counterpart Demeter. Likewise the harvest allegory on the 1935 \$10 and 1937 \$2 notes may have been derived from Annona, who represented the corn harvest, which was essential to the city of Rome with its huge population.

Following this trail of thought draws us deeper into the idea of allegories with which the history of Canadian banknotes abounds. On the early Bank of Canada notes we also find interpretations of the more modern notions of electric power, modern inventions, commerce and industry, fertility and security. It does not take much stretch of the imagination to



see these allegorical figures as a continuation of the ancient practice by which abstract notions are represented by human-looking figures. For example, some of the personifications depicted on Roman imperial coins include Abundantia (abundance), Clementia (mercy), Iustitia (Justice), Pax (peace), Pietas (piety), Salus (health) and Spes (Hope), among many others. One of the definitions of allegory is "a symbolic representation." It has been said that the first known use of allegory dates back to the Greek poet Homer's use of personisigned to feature the facade of that bank's head office on the backs, another design apparently inspired by the ancients.

Then there are the various seals that we encounter on colonial, Dominion of Canada and Bank of Canada notes. For a few examples, on the back of the 1878 Dominion of Canada \$1 and \$2 issues we find the Great Seal of Canada. It appears again on the right side of the face of the 1882 \$1 note. The seal of the Department of Finance appears on some of the 1914 \$2 and 1917 \$1 notes, as well as on the face of the

Their use dates back to the cylinder seals of ancient Mesopotamia, which were engraved, as the name implies, on a cylinder. The cylinder was rolled on soft clay to impress the image and the clay was allowed to dry. Seals engraved on the faces of rings - called signet rings - are known dating back to ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome. These rings were convenient for individuals to carry their personal seals around with them. In a time when most people could not read or write, a personal seal was used to authenticate a document in place of a written signature.

After the fall of the Western Roman Empire in AD 476, the use of seals declined. The popes, however, used lead seals attached to documents and eventually European monarchs began to use them once again. Beginning with Edward the Confessor, all the kings of England had their own seals and often had more than one design. Members of European noble families eventually began wearing signet rings that were engraved with their own personal seals. In Europe and North America, the seal was used not only by monarchs but by bishops, courts, officials, states and corporations. It is in the latter two cases that we encounter seals printed on some of our paper money of the past.

Many of Canada's chartered banks, at some point in their history, incorporated Roman numeral counters into at least one of their notes. These included the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Banque Canadienne Nationale, Central Bank of New Brunswick, Eastern Townships Bank, Halifax Banking Company, Imperial Bank of Canada, the Merchants Bank of Canada,

Ancient architecture has had an influence on some buildings of the 19th and early 20th centuries. A couple of banks in particular issued notes that reflect classical influence, showing a building front reminiscent of a classical portico, thus giving them a resemblance to an ancient Greek or Roman temple. In ancient times state treasuries were often stored in a temple of one of the major deities.

The back of the Bank of Montreal's 1912-dated \$5, \$20 and \$100 bills show the head office with a classical style portico at the front and a large dome on the roof. The Bank of New Brunswick note issue of 1903-06 was de-

1923-dated 25-cent note. The 1923 \$1 and \$2 notes are remarkable for the variety of colours of the seal that appears on their faces. The fronts of the 1935 series depict the Bank of Canada seal at the right. In addition, innumerable chartered banks' notes also sport the seals of their issuing institutions.

Seals have a long and fascinating history. The word derives from the Latin sigillum. The word "seal" may apply either to the device used to make an impression or to the resulting impression itself. In the latter sense, a seal is impressed into or otherwise affixed to a document in order to guarantee it.

Focus on: Proof-like singles

Canadian Coin News Trends is an estimate of retail values of the items listed, based on dealer sales, wholesale prices, auction results and precious metal prices. It assumes that coins are free of damage, problem-free and correctly graded, and that the buyer and seller have equal knowledge and motivation. The estimates contained on these pages are meant as a guide only, since exact values are set by buyers and sellers in fair negotiation.

Once again, the price changes are largely driven by higher silver prices. Increases were seen for 25-cent, 50-cent, and \$1 coins. The majority of changes were for coins dated 1957 through 1967. The changes were fairly

universal for the silver coins of the 1960s, caused solely by the increase in their intrinsic value. Adjustments were primarily focused on coins grading Proof-Like-64 and PL-65. Prices were nudged upward for coins with Cameo and Heavy Cameo to reflect the premium these attributes deserve.

The focus of this issue is Canadian Proof-Like and modern proof singles.

Price decreases were noted for 1957, 1958, and 1959 Proof-Like silver dollars. Current demand for average Proof-Like singles in PL-64 and PL-65 is somewhat subdued, so a 10 to 15 per cent downward revision was applied.

TRENDS ABBREVIATIONS

- G: Good, a worn coin with design visible but no remaining detail
- VG: Very Good, well worn with a few fine details missing
- F: Fine, the design and lettering is clearly visible, but shows signs of wear
- VF: Very Fine, uniform light wear but major elements are sharp
- EF: Extremely Fine, slight wear, all details sharp, may show some lustre
- AU: About Uncirculated, traces of wear on all surfaces, with about half of the original lustre
- MS: Mint State, coins are free from wear. The better the strike, the more lustre and fewer marks, the higher the grade
- R or B: Copper coins are graded as Red, Brown, or Red Brown depending on how much of the original colour remains.
- NBU: Numismatic Brilliant Uncirculated coins struck for Uncirculated Sets since 1977
- FV: Face Value BV Bullion Value

COIN GRADING

Coins with problems, or which are unattractive or incorrectly graded will not fare well in today's market, while discriminating collectors are prepared to pay more for coins that stand out above the rest.

When coins are graded, they are assigned a numeric value to a maximum of 70. The older descriptive terms are aligned with the numeric terms according to the following table:

(G-4) Good - Heavily worn few details but still attributable.

(VG-8) Very Good - Very worn, but all major design elements are clear, if faint.

(F-12) Fine - Very worn, but wear is even and overall design elements stand out boldly.

(VF-20) Very Fine - Moderately worn, with some finer details remaining.

(EF-40) Extremely Fine - Lightly worn; all devices are clear, major devices bold.

(AU-50) About Uncirculated - Slight traces of wear on high points; may have contact marks and little eye appeal.

(MS-60) Mint State - Strictly uncirculated but that's all; ugly coin with no luster, obvious contact marks, etc.

(MS-65) Mint State - Uncirculated with strong luster, very few contact marks, excellent eye appeal. Strike is above average.

(MS-70) Mint State Perfect - The perfect coin.

If the coin is less than mint state, grading is largely a matter of assessing the erosion. Mint state coins are more difficult because factors such as lustre and the number of location of minor marks come into play.

Misaligned upper die causes rare error

Fourth in a series on terminology describing Canadian collar die error types

In the previous three issues, I covered the misinformation that appears on the internet specifically involving the collar die.

It should be obvious that the collar die is a very important – nay, imperative – piece of hardware.

Below, I continue to explain how involved the three dies – upper, lower and collar – are in assuring that we turn out good coins, as well as what can go wrong.

Again, I will point out some of the misinformation the internet contains.

MISALIGNED DIES

A collector's blog site explains misaligned dies as follows:

"A striking error caused by one or both dies not set properly in the coining machine or worked loose during striking."

This simple sentence covers a number of issues that deserve an explanation and correction

As I pointed out previously, the bottom die is held in a fixed position. It cannot be "not set properly ... or worked loose during striking," no matter how many times it is stated incorrectly online. What that also means is that misaligned dies (plural) cannot occur because the lower die cannot be in the wrong position.

As well, the fact that the bottom die cannot move sideways means it also cannot create off-centre struck coins where the bottom die is the

Although I did not take the time to look at other sites, I did notice the following explanation on the coinsandcanada. com website: "Misaligned Die: When the top die is laterally off-set in relation to the collar and bottom die."

Note that it refers correctly to the top die only.

THE CHAT SITES

Since 1960, I have been writing about misaligned upper dies, out-of-collar blanks, off-centres, multiple strikes and other failures of the finger-feed presses manufactured by Schuler Pressen.

Unfortunately, I have never come across so much ignorance when I recently reviewed numerous websites that are supposed to educate collectors by providing accurate information. What I found instead is that many people that don't know any better but want to get in on the conversation have gravitated to the worst sites to get their (mis)information.

I would have thought that with so much correct information available on other sites, participants on chat sites would be able to separate the right from wrong and not become part of spreading misinformation.

CHAT SITE MODERATORS

The moderators volunteer their time to assure that posts are from registered members and the spelling and grammar is correct, but I assume they do not review the content for accuracy. That could be due to insufficient knowledge or a lack of time to review and contact members to suggest changes and/or make appropriate corrections before posting it on the internet for everyone to access.

Chat site moderators or members of the chat group should always assure that only correct information appears on their site. Members should submit only information they have double-checked against a number of other sites to ensure accuracy.

Moderators should review what contradictory information was posted and decide if they wish to update the infor-



mation. Alternatively, they can let their members continue to believe that everything they read on their website is accurate.

MISALIGNED PLANCHET

A member of a chat site submitted a photo of a Canadian 1981 cent, shown in Figure 1, wondering what caused it to look that way.

Another member responded that it is "struck slightly off-center, maybe 5 percent."

The moderator also posted: "I think it's a misaligned planchet because the Obv. & Rev. are off centers, worth keeping and worth a small premium. If it was only one side that was off center it would be a misaligned die, I think."

By using "I think" twice in his brief posting, the moderator does not sound very convincing – or knowledgeable – in his conclusion.

I should point out that "struck slightly off centre" and "misaligned planchet" describe the very same thing.

This coin is actually better than described by the member or moderator; they missed the best part of this error.

No reference is made to the fact that while the coin was indeed struck off centre, it was forced partly into the collar die to give us a nice partial collar strike and partial railroad wheel rim.

These additional defects turn it from a slightly off-centre coin "worth a small premium" to a multi-error rarity.

MISALIGNING HAS ITS LIMITS

One website posted the following:

"Misaligned die errors on coins occur when the dies used to strike the coin are not properly aligned, causing one side of the coin to appear off-center while the other side is perfectly centered. described as having been struck by a 'misaligned planchet.'

about as far as the four screws that held the upper die in place could incorrectly be set.

Figure 3 shows the reverse of another set-up piece whose first strike was way off, while the second try was perfectly centred.

MISALIGNED OBVERSE DESIGNS

While all previous references in this series involved misaligned dies with the reverse design on the upper die, coins with misaligned obverse designs do exist, but not because the bottom die was installed off centre.

They are dated prior to the coinage of George VI, when all working dies were imported from England.

I found this coin in a mintsealed bag that I obtained from my local Toronto-Dominion Bank branch in 1966. It was probably thrown into the finished coins bin rather than into the scrap/scizzle container (thank you pressman and quality control inspector).

The obverse design was struck by the bottom die while it was obviously correctly located below the collar die.

Although most of the images on the reverse remain fully visible, some of the beads are missing.

From time to time, a set of working dies was shipped to Canada that contained a reverse design with a configuration that would fit only in the lower holder and an obverse design that could be installed only in the upper holding mechanism.

I covered that in some detail in this column after the Robert J. Kril collection appeared in a Canadian Coin and Currency auction.

Two coins from the auction that provide proof of the transposed die set-up are shown in Figure 4.

The proof of the switched die configuration is in the "bend" where the edge of the die hit the blank planchet that was lying off centre on top of the collar die.

The top illustrations of a 1903 five-cent coin shows the

blank portion of the obverse of the blank that was outside of the striking area going upward. That is normal for an off-centre strike because while the upper die forced the portion of the blank that was over the cavity into the collar die, the edge of the collar die forced the portion of the blank that was outside the striking area to curve up-

wards; the path of least resis-

The 1874 five cents in the lower photos of Figure 4 are another example.

After a normal centred strike, the coin stayed behind and, without interference from the new blank that was supposed to drop into the collar die, was struck a second time.

Since the second strike was off centre, the fold also occurred.

What most likely occurred is that when this coin was pushed up by the bottom die so that it could be pushed forward into the finished coin bin, the new blank interfered with the normal process of the just-struck coin being ejected.

The struck coin was party pushed to the side from between the dies by the incoming blank and wound up being struck off centre a second time.

This is not just my theory, since the conclusion was confirmed by one of my contacts at the Royal Canadian Mint.

Bank of Montreal, Bank of Nova Scotia, La Banque Provinciale du Canada and many others, as well as a number of spurious banks.

But we don't have to rely upon chartered banks to find examples of Roman numerals among banknote counters. The 1866 Province of Canada \$10 note has a large "X" (for 10) at each end. The extremely beautiful 1912 Dominion of Canada \$5 bill not only carries a train vignette on its face; the back's most prominent feature is a large Roman numeral "V" counter in the centre.

The actual origin of the Roman number system is obscure due to lack of evidence, but it appears that it may have developed out of the system used by Rome's neighbouring people, the Etruscans. The system remained in use in Europe until the late Middle Ages, when it was eventually supplanted by the more versatile numbers that we still use today.

As I have demonstrated, there are numerous ways in which designs on the paper money we collect has been influenced by the distant past. Indeed, the past and the present are inextricably connected.

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Militaria sale spans Waterloo to world wars

Spanning more than a century of history, the Canadian Numismatic Company (TCNC)'s Sept. 23-24 Militaria Sale showcases 640 lots ranging from Waterloo medals and colonial honours to Second World War gallantry awards and Canadian academic distinctions.

"We are extremely proud to present this catalogue and sale that should be viewed thoroughly," said auctioneer Marc Verret. "This offering should make some nice moments and active evenings of auctioning."

The auction opens with a Canadian General Service Medal named to Pte. T.J. Wheeler of the 2nd Provisional Battalion, complete with a Fenian Raid 1866 clasp. The unit was part of the Quebec Rifles and served during the Red River Rebellion. This medal carries added provenance, having been sold by Arctic Medals in 2015.

Lot 5 offers a Canadian grouping of four medals awarded to Cpl. Richard Young. The centrepiece is a Queen's South Africa Medal with five clasps: South Africa 1902, South Africa 1901, Transvaal, Orange Free State, and Cape Colony. Also included are a pair of First World War medals and a Royal Canadian Humane

Association Medal, awarded for Young's bravery in rescuing three people from drowning at Hanlan's Point in 1911

Lot 7 is already generating strong interest online with a Canadian grouping of two medals awarded to Capt. C.E. Netteleton. The set includes a Colonial Auxiliary Forces Medal inscribed to Netteleton and a Distinguished Flying Cross. While thorough searches of RCAF and RAF rolls, the *London Gazette* and other historical

records reveal no one named C.E. Netteleton or Nettleton as a recipient of the Distinguished Flying Cross, there is documentation of his award of the Efficiency Decoration.

Waterloo medals form another highlight of the sale. Lot 21 features an 1815 Waterloo Medal awarded to Lt. Abraham Dent of the 2nd Battalion, 59th Regiment of Foot. Dent perished the following year when the regiment's transport ship, *The Seahorse*, wrecked off Tramore Bay in Ireland, with nearly all lives lost. The medal includes a miniature dress example.

Lot 22 is another Waterloo piece, awarded to Soldat Christian Klusmann of the Landwehr Battalion Hildesheim, serving under Col. Ernst von Vincke's 5th (Hanoverian) Brigade. Klusmann was one of 640 Hildesheim soldiers posted at the extreme left of Duke of Wellington Arthur Wellesley's line during the battle.

The Second World War is represented by Lot 25, a framed commemorative grouping honouring Leading Seaman James Magennis. Born in Belfast in 1919, Magennis was the only native of Northern Ireland to receive the Victoria Cross during the war. He earned the award during Operation Struggle in 1945, when he helped attack the Japanese cruiser *Takao*

near Singapore. The set includes his portrait, a copy of the VC, campaign medals, and a facsimile of the *London Gazette* citation. His original medals are displayed at the Imperial War Museum in London.

Lot 26 moves into Britain's colonial past with a grouping awarded to Charles Cecil Farquharson Dundas. He served as governor of the Bahamas from 1937 to 1940 and of Uganda from 1940 to 1944. Known for his engagement with local communities, he also managed wartime challenges, including airfield construction for Allied defences. His group includes campaign medals, the Order of the British Empire, the Order of St. Michael and St. George, and a miniature dress set.

Collectors of Canadian militaria will note Lot 528, a British Columbia Garrison Artillery officer's sabretache, pouch and belt. This Victorian-era ensemble, presented in a large frame, is a superb example of the craftsmanship and symbolism of regimental dress, seldom offered complete at auction.

Lot 608 features an 1877 Gold University of Manitoba Medal awarded to Edmund Henry Botterell for the Chown Prize in Surgery

(class of 1930). Botterell went on to serve as professor of surgical neurology at Queen's University in Ontario from 1971 to 1974.

From Waterloo to the world wars, from colonial administrators to Canadian academics, TCNC's September sale reflects a wide span of history through medals, regalia and personal stories.

Headless Britannia Blacksmith poses many questions

Was it a cruel joke by an adversary of Britain or was it a deliberate attempt to leave the head off of Britannia for another reason on this Blacksmith token?

In the April 1885 *American Journal of Numismatics*, R.W. McLachlan documented the inspiration for the term "Blacksmith" token.

"Previous to 1837, when the lack of specie caused copper change to be accepted inbuilt, there lived in Montreal a blacksmith of dissipated habits. He prepared a die for himself and when he wished to have a 'good time' he struck two or three dollars in these coppers and thereby supplied himself with sufficient change with which to gratify his wishes."

This story was related to McLachlan by his mother, who lived in Montreal at the time and recalled these coppers and the blacksmith shop where they were struck.

In "A Blacksmith Token," published in May 1908, Eugene Courteau listed 28 varieties and described them as of "poor workmanship." The "rudely struck" pieces began circulate in the 1830s. While initially counterfeits of British half-pence, this was expanded to include counterfeits of American Hard Times tokens and tokens of Upper Canada.

The Courteau article was followed up in April 1910 by Howland Wood's *The Canadian Blacksmith Coppers*.

"The dies in all cases crudely cut, were, in many instances, purposely left unfinished, so as to give the issued the appearance of a worn coin," Wood wrote.

"Although they thus produced a rude coinage these early Canadian coiners showed considerable skill in so making fresh coins bear

the appearance of an old worn out but still legal currency that they were able to circulate vast quantities of their spurious imitations."

In attempting to make exact copies, the coiner asked the designs to be in the opposite direction of their prototypes.

COPPER VARIETY REPORTED

Let's take a closer look at the Blacksmith token recorded by Courteau as No. 16BT. In general, its obverse depicts a bust facing left and the reverse portrays the female figure of Britannia seated on a shield. She is holding a sprig in her left hand and her right hand is extended up. There is no inscription. Courteau added several details: brass composition with a square chin, with the lower bow shaped and "although weakly struck is the largest of the series." On the reverse, Britannia's head is not shown; the upper exergual line touches the centre of the shield stand instead of terminating under

Both Courteau and Wood agreed that Britannia is headless and that the exergual line runs to the shield support. Interestingly, Wood's description contrasts with Courteau's in certain respects. On the obverse while Courteau calls this a "square chin variety," Wood calls the chin "small and pointed." Wood indicated that the lower bow is "thick and square" and that this variety (his No. 14) is found with both yellowish and reddish brass. He also listed this token in copper composition (No. 15) and indicated that this variety was part of his collection. Courteau recorded only a brass variety. Does the copper variety really exist?



Wood explained that the Blacksmiths' date of issue is difficult to determine because they were issued without authority or publicity and a record of their issues was not kept by the coiners. Wood categorized the No. 14 variety as part of the head to the left brass series. According to Wood, this group of Blacksmiths was issued later than the English imitations of the regal coinage. Although he had no direct proof, he argued that this was the earliest group of Blacksmiths, issued during the first quarter of the 19th century. However, their manufacture continued at a later date as shown by their rusted dies and thinner flans. Wood also argued that the brass pieces were struck after the earlier copper pieces and were copied from these rather than from worn regal coinage. This would mean that the copper variety listed by Wood as No. 15 was struck first.

EXAMPLE SOLD AT 2018 AUCTION

A Wood No. 14 (Charlton BL-10) was offered as part of a group of three Blacksmith Tokens (lot 29347) in an April 20-21, 2018 Heritage Auctions sale. Part of the Doug Robins Collection of Canadian Tokens, the piece was graded by NGC as AU-55 Brown, and weighed 5.96 grams with a brass composition and coinage alignment. The other two tokens in the lot were a Wood No. 16 in Fine and a Wood 33 in VF plus. This lot realized \$200 US on an estimate of \$400-\$500.

MANY QUESTIONS

It appears that the coiner's deliberate attempt to produce a crude coinage from wellworn dies resulted in the absence of Britannia's head. We know nothing about the coiner or issuer, so there is no

evidence that this was an attempt to mock Britain.

Courteau and Wood expressed contrasting view-points on the chin on the obverse. The auction image is clear enough to examine this. Take a look. To me, the nose is pointed and the chin is round, not square or pointed.

Wood listed a copper variety while Courteau did not. Wood said this copper piece was part of his collection at the time, but Charlton's Canadian Colonial Tokens states that this copper variety "cannot be confirmed."

Let's go to Jeffrey Hoare Auctions' sale held Oct. 26-28, 1989 in conjunction with the Torex show in Toronto. A Wood No. 14, brass variety in VF with two small obverse edge nicks and a "14" pencilled" in the field, ex. Lorraine (lot 2447) was offered with an estimate of \$40.

The following lot offered a Wood No. 15, sort of. This token had an upset reverse, weighed 5.96 grams, was in VG-Fine condition and was ex. Courteau and Mabbot. The estimate was \$70. The description included the words

"supposed" and "if it existed," which once again casts doubt the existence of the copper variety.

This is followed by a long explanation of the token's provenance. In summary, the coins had two envelopes, one with comments from Courteau and the other with comments from T.O. Mabbot. Courteau's comments were "Blac, C.16, W 15 unique in copper? No it's brass."

The second envelope has a statement from Mabbot as follows: "W.15 is only reddish brass, the full 'variety in copper' is not unique but a ghost. Wood's supposed specimen is here."

A letter to Mabbot from a friend named Tom indicated that Wood No. 15 does not exist.

"I have his (Wood's) specimen, which went to Courteau and then to me, and it IS brass."

This auction does not resolve the question of the existence of the copper variety. My opinion is that this copper variety does not exist unless an X-ray fluorescence analysis can confirm it.

warehouse receipt is presented, the owner is obligated to restore the good deposited. A warehouse specializing in money is known as a bank."

The gold standard represented the pinnacle of monetary discipline. Central banks held large gold reserves to ensure their notes could be converted into gold as required by their charters. When reserves declined because of balance-ofpayments deficits or adverse domestic circumstances, they would raise their discount rates, attracting foreign investment and bringing more gold into the country. This system ensured individual exchange rates remained stable, ruling out the competitive devaluations proven so destructive in earlier eras.

The system's rigid discipline, however, would prove both its greatest strength and its fatal weakness.

CANADA'S BANKING EVOLUTION

As Canada emerged as a nation during the late 19th century, its need for sophisticated financial institutions dramatically increased.

The country's early banking system developed differently from that of the United States, with a small number of banks establishing branches in multiple communities rather than numerous local banks serving single communities.

The creation of a domestic financial system became one of the most important manifestations of Canada's evolving capitalist economy. The shortlived Canada Banking Company, founded in Montréal in 1792, was among the country's first banks; the Bank of Montréal followed in 1817, the Bank of New Brunswick in 1820 and the Bank of Upper Canada in 1821. By 1886, Canada boasted 38 chartered banks, reflecting the rapid pace of financial development.

The newly formed Government of Canada's passing of the 1871 Bank Act formalized financial activity. Insurance companies also flourished during this period, including Sun Life in 1865, Mutual Life in 1870, Confederation Life in 1871 and London Life in 1874. Markets for investment exchange followed with the Montréal Stock Exchange established in 1832, the Toronto

Stock Exchange in 1861 and the Winnipeg Commodity Exchange in 1904.

The repeal of the Corn Laws by the British Parliament in 1846 terminated colonial trading preferences and marked the symbolic end of mercantilism in Canada while ushering in a new era of capitalism.

FREE MARKETS AND TRADE

Canada's early experience with free trade principles came through necessity rather than ideology.

After Britain adopted free trade in the 1840s, eliminating tariff preferences for Canadian timber and other goods, Canadian merchants sought new markets. The issuance of the 1849 Annexation Manifesto by Montréal's merchant class called for British North America to detach itself from Britain and become part of the United States, seeking free access to U.S. markets.

While the annexation movement failed, it established the principle that Canada must seek U.S. markets and allow U.S. goods to enter Canada. The British, fearing the loss of Canada, secured the 10-year Elgin-Marcy Treaty (also called the "Reciprocity Agreement") with the United States in 1854, bringing prosperity to many sectors of the Canadian economy through the growth of barrier-free trade.

During this reciprocity decade, two significant moves brought the Canadian and U.S. economies closer together.

On Jan. 1, 1858, the United Province of Canada adopted the decimal system for its currency, recognizing that "situated on the borders of the United States and with more than one-half of its trade carried on with that country, it was necessary to adopt the currency system in force there."

The early Canadian railways, initially designed as portage roads to bypass obstacles on the St. Lawrence River, soon connected with U.S. railroads to provide easier access to those markets.

GOLD STANDARD UNDER PRESSURE

Despite its theoretical elegance, the international gold standard faced mounting pressures by the early 20th century.

The system required countries to subordinate domestic economic concerns to the maintenance of gold convert-

ibility. Central banks adhered to the gold standard's rule of maintaining convertibility above all other considerations, serving as the economy's nominal anchor.

The outbreak of the First World War in August 1914 immediately threatened this delicate balance. In the days prior to the war, withdrawals from Canadian banks dramatically increased as depositors demanded gold or government notes rather than banknotes. The federal government took emergency steps to stabilize the banks, including ending the convertibility of notes to

gold for the duration of the war and authorizing the federal finance minister to act as a lender of last resort.

Although it was widely expected Canada would return to the gold standard after the war, it was not until 1926 that the government made that reversal; however, the return proved short lived.

When Britain abandoned the gold standard in September 1931 during the depths of the Great Depression, Canada followed suit by prohibiting the export of gold on Oct. 31, 1931, unofficially taking the country off the standard. A year and a half later, the federal government ended the convertibility of government notes for gold.

CENTRAL BANKING IS BORN

The collapse of the gold standard during the Great Depression exposed the limitations of the old monetary order.


In Canada, the prolonged economic crisis, combined with unprecedented public criticism of the banking system, contributed to Prime Minister R.B. Bennett's decision to establish a central bank.

In 1933, Bennett instituted the Royal Commission on Banking and Currency, which recommended establishing a central bank for Canada. The commission's members included Scottish jurist Lord Macmillan, Bank of England director Sir Charles Addis, Canadian former finance minister William Thomas White, and other prominent figures.

One of Bennett's key motivations was to lessen Canada's dependence on U.S. banks based in New York, which he believed had too much influ-

ence on the value of the Canadian dollar.

The Bank of Canada was chartered under the Bank of Canada Act on July 3, 1934, initially as a privately owned corporation to ensure freedom from partisan political influence. The act's preamble outlined its purpose: "to regulate credit and currency in the best interests of the economic life of the nation, to control and protect the external value of the national monetary unit and to mitigate by its influence fluctuations in the general level of production, trade, prices and employment."

On March 11, 1935, the Bank of Canada began operations under its first governor, Graham Towers, a 37-year-old Canadian with extensive international experience at the Royal Bank of Canada. The bank became publicly owned in 1938 and operates as a Crown corporation today.

RESERVE BANKING AND MONETARY CONTROL

The establishment of central banks marked a fundamental shift from the automatic mechanisms of the gold standard to active monetary management.

Central banks emerged with the authority to create money, regulate commercial banks and serve as lenders of last resort. Under the fractional reserve banking system developing alongside central banking, commercial banks were required to hold only a fraction of deposits on hand, using the remainder to create loans and stimulate economic activity.

In Canada, the Bank of Canada gained authority to influence the money supply through various policy tools,

including open market operations, setting the bank rate and establishing reserve requirements for commercial banks.

FRACTIONAL RESERVE AND INTERNATIONAL MONEY

Fractional reserve banking became the foundation of modern monetary systems, allowing banks to create money through lending while maintaining only a fraction of deposits as reserves.

The operation of both the gold standard and early central banking systems relied heavily on international co-operation. During the classical gold stan-

dard period, central banks often assisted each other during crises, such as the Barings crisis of 1890. This co-operation helped maintain the credibility of the system, as the gold standard was above all a "commitment" system requiring policymakers to preserve price stability.

MODERN NUMISMATIC LEGACY

Today's collectors and numismatists preserve the tangible history of this monetary evolution.

The Royal Canadian Mint, established in 1908 as a branch of the Royal Mint in London, became the Royal Canadian Mint in 1931, when Canada gained full control over its monetary affairs. Since then, it has grown into one of the largest and most versatile mints in the world.

Canadian numismatic collecting reflects this rich monetary history, with collectors specializing in everything from pre-Confederation tokens to modern commemorative coins and all manner of historical and modern banknotes.

The transformation from gold-backed money to central bank-managed fiat currency represents one of the most significant economic developments of the modern era. Canada's experience during this transition — from its early adoption of floating exchange rates to the establishment of the Bank of Canada — positioned the country as a leader in monetary innovation and management. •

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

While the 1957 date is scarce in higher grades, the valuation for coins in Proof-Like-66 with Cameo seemed lofty at \$1,200. As a result, the price was lowered to \$1,000. Coins continue to be graded; however, collector demand remains focused on coins that are nicer than those most often offered. In this case, collectors are willing to pay strong prices for coins of this date displaying Heavy Cameo or Ultra-Heavy Cameo. While "Ultra" coins don't truly exist, 1957-dated coins may need to grade PL-67 with Cameo to achieve strong demand.

Historically, the ratio is significant: a net value of about 30 times face value. On Jan. 17, 1980, when silver prices peaked at \$49.95 U.S. (or \$58.77 Canadian), refineries across North America were overwhelmed with submissions. Processing delays stretched two or three months, and discounts for large lots of silver reached about 30 per cent due to price risk. A \$1,000 face-value bag of Canadian silver melted for \$35,260 at the 1980 peak, but sellers only netted about \$25,000 per bag for large lots. Small lots brought 20 to 22 times face value.

That risk discount proved crucial. The Hunt brothers were forced to sell their silver contracts beginning in January

Modern proof singles saw increases simply because silver is higher. The 25-cent, 50-cent, and \$2-coins made of silver and removed from Proof sets now carry base values of \$15 for quarters and \$25 for halves and "twoonies." Only the 1991 and 1992 Caribou 25-cent coins saw added increases due to higher collector demand.

The price of silver recently reached \$41 U.S. per ounce. Converted to Canadian dollars, that's \$57.59 per ounce – very near its all-time high. It is currently trading at \$57. At this price level, a Canadian .800 fine silver dollar contains about \$34 worth of silver. A silver 50-cent piece has an intrinsic value of \$17, and a quarter is worth \$8.50. When melted, the value achieved is typically 8 to 10 per cent less.

1980, pushing prices down. Silver traded between \$30 and \$48 an ounce for several weeks, but by March it was trending lower. On "Silver Thursday," March 27, 1980, the price plunged from \$20 U.S. to \$10.90 per ounce – just one-fifth of its level 10 weeks earlier.

I share this story because refining capacity for large lots of silver again seems strained. Processing times are increasing, which restricts cash flow. Refineries are becoming more selective about the silver they will accept, depending on turnaround times. While I do not believe the current rally in precious metals is anywhere near over, the days of achieving high percentages for certain products may be coming to an end.
